Over the years there were many trips to the hospital, EEGs, bloodwork & many other tests, going up and down on seizure meds, off one med & onto another to find the right med & dose to treat her type of seizures.








In her early teen years, she attended a school dance, we were unaware that strobe, laser, or flashing lights would possibly be a trigger, my daughter had a seizure while there, and her friend brought her home. The neurologist ordered an EEG test where my daughter was rediagnosed with photosensitivity on top of already being diagnosed with Genetic Generalized Epilepsy. Everything changed, more education was needed.










Keep talking about it and educate others.
